Our education system does not yet provide for a full and balanced and fully accurate account of Guyana's rich history. More text books are required to deal with this subject, written specifically for the different age groups of the students.

One of the books that. has been neglected in the past and should be used in our educational system is Ashton Chase's "A History of Trade Unionism in Guyana: 1900 to 1961." It also contains an epilogue which carries the history to 1964. Chase's history book was written in 1964 and by the 70's was out of print. Fortunately, through the perseverance of progressive trade unions it was reprinted in 2006 and launched at the NAACIE trade union hall last year.
