


Madam,

Madam,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated 29th December, 1956, which was received by me to-day, 2nd of January, 1957.

You will recall that in an interview in my office in November, 1956, I notified you verbally, that you should put your application for a visa to enter the United States through the Consul in British Guiana if you decided to leave this country for the United States after the 1st December 1956.

I now note that you have made a booking for New York on January 24th, 1957, and that you have informed the Consulate General for the U.S.A. in Trinidad. Since receiving your letter, I have been in touch with the Consul in Georgetown, Mr. John Cope, and I have been given to understand that all the papers dealing with your visa application have been transferred to his Consulate here from Trinidad. It is therefore imperative in your own interests, if you wish to leave the Colony on the 24th January, 1957, that you should make an immediate application to the Consul in Georgetown, who will process your visa application. I have also been given to understand by the Consulate that you were instructed in a previous letter that your application for a visa should be submitted before January 1st, 1957. For this reason, you are advised to visit the Consulate and put your application in order with the least possible delay.

As regards the restriction order now in force against you, I have submitted a copy of your letter under reference to the Chief Secretary, so that the necessary action can be taken to permit you to leave the Colony.

Should there be any unforeseen difficulties, you are advised to make an appointment to see the writer in this office.
